His legal background includes prosecution, risk assessment, patent analysis, product clearance/freedom to operate, and litigation. His range of technical experience includes nanotechnology crystalline films, software, hospital medication systems, pharmaceuticals, oil field and biofuels technology, biotechnology and chemical instrumentation, chemical and semiconductor manufacturing processes, plant variety protection, infrared motion detection systems, polymers, and resins.

He is a past president and board member of the San Francisco Intellectual Property Law Association and a member of the Federal Circuit Bar Association, American Intellectual Property Law Association, AIPPI (International Association for the Protection of Intellectual Property) and the American Chemical Society.

Speeches and Publications:

Mr. Dickson has spoken to various groups on current issues of patent enforcement and prosecution. His most recent presentations include a January 30, 2008 program on ethical obligations under the PTO Rules at the Los Angeles Intellectual Property Law Association 11th Annual Washington in the West Conference, a Sept. 7, 2007 program on inequitable conduct for the Loyola Law School IP Focus Series: "Patent Prosecution," and an August 15, 2007 panel presentation on recent inequitable conduct litigation for the Patent Standing Committee of the California State Bar. Mr. Dickson was the editor for the third edition of "Marketing Your Invention," released by the ABA Section of Intellectual Property Law in March 2009. Mr. Dickson is the co-author of "U.S. Expands Patentability of Software and Business Methods: Can There Be Patents on Familiar Ways to Solve Business Problems?" which was published in *IP Worldwide* in the 1999 January-February issue. In addition, he is the author or co-author of 20 technical papers and presentations, a patentee of U.S. Patent No. 4,533,740, "β-Lactone Process," and a member of Sigma Xi, The Scientific Research Society.

Representative Trials and Pre-Trial Decisions*McKesson Information Solutions Inc. v. Bridge Medical, Inc.*

Mr. Dickson represented McKesson as the patent owner in this infringement suit regarding wireless patient bedside medication equipment. The patent was held unenforceable, but Mr. Dickson successfully opposed a multi-million dollar motion for attorney fees, one of only two known published decisions at the time denying such fees.

3D Systems, Inc. v. James V. Crivello and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute

Mr. Dickson represented the defendants in this patent and contract action involving polymer modeling materials. After defeating a preliminary injunction motion, he obtained a favorable settlement.

Allcare Healthcare Management System, Inc. v. Cerner Corp. Healthcon Corp., McKesson HBOC Corp., IDX Systems Corp., Merck-Medco

Managed Care, LLC, Eclipsys Solutions Corp., Express Scripts, Inc., PCS Health Systems, Inc., Science Applications Int'l Corp., Envoy Corp., and Diversified Pharmaceutical Services, Inc.

Mr. Dickson represented McKesson in this patent infringement litigation involving medical information software and obtained a favorable settlement.

Primus Corporation v. Bio-Rad Laboratories, Inc.

Mr. Dickson represented Bio-Rad in a patent infringement and antitrust case for medical instrumentation. A favorable settlement was obtained after a grant of summary judgment dismissing the antitrust claims.

KLA-Tencor Corp. v. Tokyo Seimitsu Co., Ltd and TSK America, Inc.

Mr. Dickson represented Tokyo Seimitsu and TSK America in a patent infringement matter involving semiconductor equipment for defect detection. The patent was invalidated on summary judgment motion.

Mr. Dickson represented the plaintiff Cleangro in this plant patent infringement and contract breach claim. The case was settled.

Applied Materials Inc. v. Novellus Systems, Inc.

Mr. Dickson represented Applied Materials in patent litigation on semiconductor manufacturing equipment. The case settled after successful summary judgment motions and a favorable jury trial decision for Applied.

Trilogy Development Group v. Teknowledge Corp.

Mr. Dickson represented Teknowledge in this patent litigation involving artificial intelligence software. The case was settled.

Hoechst Celanese Corp. v. Brewer Science

Mr. Dickson represented Hoechst in a patent infringement declaratory judgment action involving polymers used in semiconductor mask manufacturing process. A favorable settlement was obtained after Brewer dismissed its patent claims and granted a covenant not to sue.

Intel v. Hyundai Electronics Industries Co., Ltd and Hyundai Electronics America, Inc.

Mr. Dickson represented Intel in this patent litigation on a semiconductor manufacturing process. The case was settled on favorable terms.

Fuji Optical Systems, Inc. v. High Tech Medical Instrumentation, Inc., et al. (Counterclaim Defendants Skjerven, Morrill, MacPherson, Franklin & Friel, Steven Caserza, and Leydig, Voit & Mayer)

McKesson Information Solutions Inc. v. Bridge Medical, Inc

Mr. Dickson represented McKesson on claim construction matters that began with a two-day hearing on 18 claim terms at issue for a patient identification and verification system using bar code scanning for bedside patient medication delivery.

Arbor Software Company v. Planning Sciences, Inc. and Planning Sciences, Int'l

Mr. Dickson represented Planning Sciences, Inc. and Planning Sciences, Int'l in this infringement case involving multidimensional database software, including a one-day claim construction hearing.
